The Most Benign 'Live Snakes' Experience

Sit in on a 'Michigan Snakes Alive' presentation and you will agree... If you harbor any level of uncomfortability toward snakes, Nature Discovery offers the most benign venue you'll likely ever encounter to help you feel better about them.

Currently ten of the state's seventeen species are housed at the 'big, little' private nature center attached to our home north of Williamston. For a snake enthusiast, the interactive opportunities on a visit here will transform you into the proverbial 'kid in a candy store.' For those on the squeamish end of the spectrum, the snakes are at your disposal for as up-close and hands-on of an experience as you wish – and at your personal pace. If you live too far to feasibly make the drive, watch for a public venue near you (i.e., library, nature center) where this presentation has been scheduled, then make it a point to attend.

Among many other Michigan-specific wildlife presentation titles, we've offered a live Michigan Snakes program going all the way back to the 90s. However, a particularly fortuitous presentation on the topic, contracted by Michigan Audubon Society during their annual Spring Fling at Whitefish Point in 2008, resulted in a substantial surge of future audiences.

Kathy and Jim Bricker of Cheboygan-based Straits Area Audubon Society were in attendance. Afterward, they introduced themselves and agreed with my point that this content should be mainstream education in every Michigan public school. Then they got to work. The following year Kathy had arranged a week in which the presentation would not only be given at an SAAS meeting, but fundraised and scheduled fifth grade classrooms in a half dozen northern Michigan schools to receive the program. Kathy and Jim hosted the snakes and me in their home.

Prior to the start of a presentation many students express varying levels of negativity, including disgust and outright fear. Over the ensuing hour, though, live specimens of the very snake species they are likely to encounter around their yards and neighborhoods are presented for up-close, hands-on inspection. Misperceptions that stir widespread ambivalence are discussed, then debunked and replaced with sound information, delivered species-by-species, relating to the identification, behavior, habitat, and ecology of each.

The culmination of a 180-degree attitudinal transformation occurs when the students are given time to handle and pass the snakes among themselves in a relaxed, free-mingling format. Teachers often bustle about, taking photos of smiling faces with snakes cradled in arms or even draped around shoulders. At the conclusion the students express overwhelming *positivity*, even incredulousness and wonder not just over the snakes but over the abrupt about-face that has just taken place within themselves. They now *love* snakes and tell me so.

The presentations are so popular in northern Michigan schools that the list keeps growing. What used to be a full week of presentations has blossomed into two – one in October, the second in March. Just a few weeks ago I delivered the presentation to fifth graders and middle school students in the communities of Boyne Falls, Alanson, Mackinaw City, Onaway, and Indian River, as well as to a general audience at Indian River Area Library. Some teachers shared feedback from their classes:

"We enjoyed Jim's presentation so much that we wish he could come back to our classroom again. We learned a lot about snakes. We learned that snakes will not bite unless they feel threatened. We also learned that 70% of snakes eat their prey while it is alive. Combined, 30% of snakes secure their prey by constricting or envenomating. Now that we know more about snakes we don't feel as nervous about them. We can now inform and teach about snakes to help prevent others from killing them." - *Emily Jennings, Boyne Falls 5th grade teacher*.

"Snakes Alive provided an engaging and educational experience for our 6th graders, helping them overcome fears and misconceptions about Michigan's native snakes. Students were surprised to learn that snakes are smooth, not slimy, and gained a better understanding of local species, including the fact that Michigan has only one venomous snake. Many students expressed feeling more comfortable around snakes after the presentation, with some even holding one for the first time. The program sparked curiosity, encouraged hands-on learning, and left students excited about the role of snakes in our ecosystem." - R Heckman, 6th grade teacher, Inland Lakes Middle School.

More comments from individual students: "I was surprised at how smooth they were and that they were not slimy." "I learned that it is garter snake, not gardener." "I feel more comfortable around snakes now that I know they are usually pretty relaxed and that there is only one poisonous snake in Michigan." "I

am uncomfortable around snakes and I didn't want to be around them, but I learned to overcome that and I actually held one!" "I learned a lot and I thought it was really cool because Michigan has a lot of snakes that are not bad at all." "It was so fun and exciting to see all of them just crawling around and not being scary at all."

Beginning in April 2023, Julia Chambers, founder and executive director of A Few Friends for the Environment of the World (https://www.affew.org/), based in Ludington, has contracted us to give 'Michigan Snakes Alive' annually to fourth grade students in schools throughout Mason County (AFFEW: Good Snakes http://naturediscovery.net/pdf/WILD%20TIMES%20May23.pdf). The snakes and I will be back for more next week.



Would you like 'Michigan Snakes Alive' in your school, library or other community setting? For schools, recommended grades are fourth through high school. However, a more simplified version of the program is available for younger grades (In fact, Michigan Snakes is the presentation theme for kindergarteners at Okemos Public Montessori later this month.). Individual classroom audience sizes (@ 25) are strongly recommended so as to ensure an abundance of personal contacts – a hallmark of the program.

Consider a Michigan Snakes interactive exhibit for venues with a walk-by audience (school science/STEM nights, libraries, nature centers, outdoor-oriented festivals, etc.), featuring up to ten state-native species learn about amid copious touching/handling and photographic opportunities.

We will bring snakes, turtles, frogs and salamanders out of tanks to interact with adults or students of any age or grade-level.

Identify and feed "the grand slam of Michigan turtles" - all ten species native to our state! Meet, pet and feed "Milberta", our always hungry Red-footed tortoise.

Handle any or all of Michigan's three species of garter snakes while learning how to tell them apart, then watch them gobble up worms and frogs. Hold or "wear" a gentle 6-foot Black Ratsnake – the

largest in the state!



Spotlight Spring Peepers on our vernal ponds.

Many more snakes, turtles, frogs and salamanders to identify and feed. Identify birds at the feeders. Take a guided walk on our trails to identify spring birds by their songs. Explore the perimeters our awakening vernal ponds soon to be hopping with frogs.

Make a special evening appointment to check out our ponds, loud with breeding frogs, then search for glowworms (firefly larvae) on the trail sides after dark. Contact us for additional information or to schedule a day and time.
