



Nothin' but SNAKES

"Are you the snake guy?"

I respond affirmatively, but, like an actor who strives to not become type-cast, will add, "For today, I am."

Nature Discovery educates on a wide range of Michigan nature and wildlife topics, birds, bugs, and beyond, but our attention-grabbing menagerie of Michigan-native reptiles and amphibians – especially the snakes – has a tendency to suck oxygen away from the wide diversity of other natural subjects we offer. On the other hand, rather than mess with success, why not embrace it?

Educating on such a broad diversity of natural subjects has always been our hallmark. However, given the overwhelming feedback we receive from audiences of any ilk, we're quite confident that we could thrive as a business offering programs that feature nothing but live Michigan snakes. Yup, they're that popular.

The snakes and I were just recently at it again in Northern Michigan communities. Since its onset in 2010, in conjunction with Cheboygan-based Straits Area Audubon Society, we've conducted various versions of Michigan Snakes Alive through what has blossomed into semi-annual sojourns - every October and March - to northern Lower Peninsula schools and libraries.

Despite inevitable windfalls, setbacks and evolving ways and means through the years, though, the core result has always remained the same, and to regular acclaim... Benign encounters in a controlled setting, with the very species they are likely to find around their neighborhoods and state, helps bolster perspectives of native snakes through more objective lenses. Tolerance, appreciation and conservationminded attitudes follow; this, in contrast to the broadly tainted status quo, wrought by fears and biases, passed from one generation to the next. Given the lack of opportunities for so many to have actual firsthand experience with them, is it any wonder that intolerance of snakes in the yard and in the environment is perpetuated?

Last month's trip up north produced informative, hands-on presentations to fifth graders at Pellston Elementary School, Wolverine Elementary School, and Sheridan Elementary in Petoskey. We visited Petoskey Children's Nature School to present to preschoolers and many of their parents, then set up an after-school exhibit for a walk-by audience at Petoskey District Library. Finally, on the way home on Friday, students in a Clare High School environmental class also participated in *Michigan Snakes Alive*.'

April of 2022 marked the onset of annual *Michigan Snakes Alive* presentations in Mason County schools. Contracted by the Ludington-based environmental organization, A Few Friends for the Environment of the World (https://www.affew.org/) the program is presented each April to fourth graders throughout the area.

Closer to home we're currently regular specialist teachers on Michigan nature/wildlife topics in many schools, including Okemos Nursery School, Stepping Stones Montessori in East Lansing, Montessori Children's House in Lansing, and additionally over the last two years, North and Forest View schools in the Lansing Public School system and Go Like the Wind Montessori in the Whitmore Lake Public School system.

Of all the Michigan wildlife topics traversed in these schools over a school year, those featuring our live native snakes are, hands down, the most popular across all grades. In contrast to the one-and-done format highlighted above - demonstrably impactful though it may be - students in these schools enjoy the fortune of *repeated* contact, and with it, far more in-depth education about the serpentine subjects than a single hour of exposure can possibly match. They handle the snakes with a palpable ease that evinces familiarity and understanding.

I acknowledge to students who have had these lessons that they are now far more educated on the topic of Michigan snakes than over ninety-five percent of adults that live here. Knowledge empowers. No matter

your age, the educated can become the educator whenever the opportunity presents itself. I encourage them to freely disseminate factual information they've learned with friends and relatives, especially when they encounter anyone who projects negativity toward snakes.

We composed a pledge as an effort to counter acts of persecution toward snakes. Its vocal recitation by students serves to fuel their resolve. We also designed and produced an accompanying sticker for distribution to the program participants - a *physical* reminder to use their knowledge to foster the acceptance of snakes as valued, functional members of local ecosystems.
